Access the NAPA Training Site



NAPA Training Navigation

This guide will help independent store employees access free training on the NAPA Training website.

Step 1: Log in to NAPA Connect

Navigate to https://NAPAConnect.com/ and log in with your employee ID ("J" number) and password.

Step 2: Click Gateway

Locate and click on the Gateway quick link at the top of the NAPAConnect.com screen.

Step 3: Access the NAPA Training Site


Click the NAPA Training link from the section titled Frequently Used or Training & Recruiting. Follow the prompts to enter the site.





Step 4: Find a Training Course

5 Winter Car Maintenance Tips for Maine Drivers.

Living in Maine means dealing with some of the harshest winter weather conditions in the country. This can take a toll on your car, so it's important to take some extra precautions to keep it in optimal working condition all season long.

While your top priority should be to winterize your vehicle with a trusted local mechanic, there are some additional everyday winter car care tips that can lessen the impact of the cold weather on your car.

Tip #1: Keep Your Gas Tank Full

The gas in your car has a much lower freezing point than water. When your tank is near-empty, it can collect condensation, which can crystalize or even freeze inside your fuel lines and gas tank. This can stop fuel from reaching the car's engine, preventing it from starting.

Additionally, the last thing you want is to get stranded driving in the middle of a blizzard with an empty gas tank. Accidents are much more frequent when there's snow and ice on the road, so there's always a chance you may be stuck because of accident-related traffic.

Tip #2: Don't Raise Your Windshield Wipers

There's a common misconception that raising your wipers during the winter will help keep them from freezing to your windshield. While this may be true, this can do more harm than good.

Raising your wipers can loosen their springs, causing them to float instead of contacting your windshield. Strong winds can also snap them off entirely or slam them into your windshield hard enough to crack it in extreme cases. Instead, try covering them in plastic baggies to prevent them from freezing to the windshield.

Tip #3: Use WD-40 on Your Door Jambs and Locks

Water can creep into the crevices of your vehicle and freeze overnight, making it nearly impossible to open your doors once they've frozen shut. Fortunately, WD-40 is a miracle worker when it comes to freeing your frozen locks and door jambs. Just a few sprays of WD-40 can loosen the ice and get you on your way.

Tip #4: Wash Your Car Throughout the Winter

While car washing may seem like a summer activity, it's actually a good idea to wash your car more often during the winter. The sand, de-icing chemicals, and salt used to keep our roads safe will actually eat away at the protective coating on your vehicle. If you don't wash it off, the paint and undercarriage of your car become exposed which can allow rust to build up quickly.

Tip #5: Get a Protective Winter Coating

If you really want to protect your car from the ravages of winter, consider getting a protective winter coating. A good winter paint coating or sealant will keep the paint from chipping, prevent rust from forming, and keep the car looking new.
